Maritime Discovery Schools ~ Director, Sarah Rubenstein

This summer over 50 teachers were hard at work in Maritime Industry Immersion and Curriculum Design Sessions. In each session, teachers connected with a maritime industry partner and spent time planning maritime and place-based projects for the upcoming school year. Thank you to Port Townsend Sails, WA State Ferries, WA State Department of Fish and Wildlife, and the Port Townsend Shipwrights Co-op for hosting a group



of teachers for a day and sharing their work with us. These sessions were funded in part by WA Sea Grant.

In the week leading up to school all teachers signed up for a curriculum design and coaching day, as well as a peer observation and teaching lab session, to further support all teachers reaching our goal of facilitating at least two maritime or place-based projects with their students this school year.

The district wide back-to-school professional learning day was full of inspiration for incorporating creativity and innovation into projects. We hosted 15 community members' lively conversation about the needs in our community at our annual salmon feast lunch, which was prepared by our district food service staff. Our keynote speaker, Lynn Dierking, from Oregon State University School of Education, noted that it was the best luncheon food she had ever tasted. Our teachers are energized and prepared to head into the school year with new, and re-envisioned, maritime and place-based learning in place.

From PTHS ~ Principal, Carrie Ehrhardt

We've had a great start to our school year! All of our back to school activities for students, parents and faculty went smoothly. Students returned to school energized and excited to reconnect with friends.

Last week, eight PTHS students began their participation in the Watershed Science and Stewardship class, sponsored by Jude Rubin and the Northwest Watershed Institute. These students will earn a .5 PTHS credit for participating in the service projects offered throughout the school year. Five of these students are taking on a major internship project around an area of needed environmental restoration in our community, for an additional .5 credit. This new project-based class is an example of how we are able to leverage our place-based community resources to offer credit-bearing programs to PTHS students, outside of the traditional classroom setting and school day.

Another new program being launched this week is our Redhawk Mentors. In an effort to create a stronger sense of culture for our freshmen, 13 junior and senior age student Mentors will be working with freshmen and their teachers for three days (Wednesday-Friday) during this first week of school. Structured team building and school orientation activities will be held at Fort Worden on Wednesday and Thursday, followed by a program offered at the Wooden Boat Festival on Friday. Thanks to the 13 outstanding student Mentors dedicating their time over the summer to work with excellent staff members Brandi Hageman, Jen Kruse and Kelley Watson, in putting this program together for our freshmen.

Our first home football game this past Friday night against Sequim had our fans on the edge of their seats. With the final score Sequim 27 to PT 26, our Redhawks played extremely well and we are looking forward to our next home game, this Thursday, September 8 against Port Angeles. This event is also our Andy Palmer game. Other opening home events for fall sports include Soccer and Volleyball against Klahowya on September 15, and Cross Country on September 28. and she is the speech instructor. She will work with students at Blue Heron and Port Townsend HS. Laurie just finished her degree in Portland and is very excited to be working in Port Townsend.

The district has started a new program for high school age students to gain some work skills in what is known as a transition program. Students will be working at Fort Worden on various jobs throughout the year. They will gain skills in groundskeeping, kitchen work, laundry, housekeeping and office work. With this training it is expected these students will be employable in the community in the next couple of years.

Assessment ~ Director, Patrick Kane

Parents/guardians will be receiving information in September from their student's respective building regarding spring assessments for the Smarter Balanced Assessment (SBA), Measurement of Student Progress (MSP), End of Course Exam (EOC) and Washington-Access to Instruction and Management (WA-AIM). Please be aware that these assessments are a snapshot of your student's performance at a given time. Student progress in school is also measured by daily classroom assessment, district assessment, credit accrual and grade point average.

If you have questions about the State assessment(s) please arrange a meeting with your school's counselor. This will give you the opportunity to understand the assessment and also provide an opportunity to develop a plan of learning for your student. Parents and guardians of high school students are encouraged to find out more information about assessment and how it ties in with your student's graduation goals.

K-5 Math Curriculum Training ~ Ann Healy-Raymond

On September 2nd, teachers from Grant Street and Blue Heron met to learn about the newly adopted Math curriculum for grades K-5. Teachers learned from a trainer who also teaches with the Bridges Curriculum,



how the program works, and about the different curriculum components. This curriculum received the highest rating from EdReports, a non-profit devoted to rating curriculum in the areas of focus and coherence, rigor and mathematical practices and usability. Every teacher on the curriculum review team selected Bridges as their first choice. Teachers especially liked the Number Corner element of the program, where students daily engage in discourse about mathematical concepts.

Minds on Mathematics ~ Jason Lynch, Title/LAP Director

This summer we offered a professional development opportunity for our teachers entitled "Minds on Mathematics". The author of Minds on Mathematics, Wendy Ward Hoffer, was the facilitator of this top-notch learning opportunity and over 55 of our K-12 staff attended. This professional development engaged our teachers in using thinking strategies to support students' mathematical thinking as well as taught teachers how workshop model instruction can scaffold students' independence as mathematical problem solvers. Another learning objective was to develop a community of learners where students deepen their mathematical understanding through discourse.

Summer Programs ~ Jason Lynch

Building on the success of last year's summer program, four-week summer school programs were offered at both Blue Heron and Grant Street. Both programs included small group instruction in mathematics and literacy taught by Grant Street and Blue Heron teachers. This program was a partnership with the YMCA's "Feed Your Brain" program, which provided meals to the participating students. Both Grant Street and Blue Heron schools were open food sites through the "Feed Your Brain" program which allowed any child eighteen years and younger to receive meals at both schools. At Grant Street the garden was integrated to teach literacy through the use of stories, life science, and journaling. At Blue Heron, incoming third graders that needed extra instructional support were invited to attend so they could meet Blue Heron teachers and become familiar with their new school. Fifty-five Grant Street students regularly attended and over 33 students attended the Blue Heron program.


