
## **HR/Payroll News**

CAPITAL PROJECT - New Elementary School

We are well on our way in the design drawings for the new Grant Street School with the intent to go to permitting in January. The drawing above shows the layout of the rooms. The permitting process will take approximately three months to get us to the point of construction that is scheduled to begin at the end of this school year. There was interest and excitement at a recent Grant Street staff meeting as to the flexibility of the classroom design and the ability to create new learning environments that can incorporate the idea of collaborative teaching. The outside learning spaces in the courtyard will include a covered learning space with benches, tables and a operable sink. Remember, we will not make 100% of people 100% satisfied with the plan, but we know we will have a far superior facility than the current elementary school.

## **Title and LAP Programs - Jason Lynch**

Port Townsend School District receives federal Title 1 funds and the state funded Learning Assistance Program (LAP) at our schools to provide additional assistance to struggling learners.

Grant Street provides a reading resource program called the Eagle Room where all students are provided individualized instruction. Kindergarten students and targeted first through fourth grade students receive four days of reading instruction per week. On Wednesdays, the reading specialist and paraprofessionals meet with each of the classroom teachers to collaborate on student progress and plan future reading instruction. Literacy instruction is provided in a small-group format, and lessons are targeted based on reading assessment data completed by the classroom teacher and Eagle Room staff. An Eagle Math Room is being established at Grant Street and the goal is to offer the same type of support in math as we do in reading. A part time math interventionist and math coach offer additional small group mathematics instruction and in-classroom support to targeted students.

Blue Heron is beginning its third year implementing the Read 180 program for students in grades 4-8. Read 180 personalizes the learning experiences through IT software and small and whole group instruction that engages students in reading, writing, speaking, and listening. Students are exposed to a range of fiction and nonfiction texts that are relevant to content-area classes. The Common Core State Standards, embedded in daily reading and writing tasks, require students to use textual evidence to support main ideas. Read 180 also develops student proficiency in conducting research on topics studied in class. Students are given multiple opportunities to practice oral reading fluency along with vocabulary development. Additionally, Blue Heron's 4th and 5th grade students receive literacy support by the reading specialist during their library classes.

Port Townsend High School is accessing LAP funding to offer credit recovery courses to students that need to regain credits from a failed class. The credit recovery courses are taught by PTHS teachers and are teaching credit recovery in core classes such as English, social studies, science and math. The goal of our after school credit recovery program is to support our district's goal of increasing our high school graduation rate.

## **From PTHS ~ Principal, Carrie Ehrhardt**

Each year the high school ASB works to collect donations for the Port Townsend Food Bank. Monetary donations are collected by students who volunteer to sit at a table inside our local Safeway store. This year students also voted to give a portion of their Homecoming ticket sales to support this worthy cause. In total, the donation check from PTHS for this year is \$4,815.19. The check will be presented to Food Bank Manager Shirley Moss, by our ASB President, Sam Meier.

Back by popular demand, the high school library will now be open during student lunch times and after school. We've made some adjustments to the library staff lunch times to allow student access during lunch. This is an important time for many of our students who ride the bus to and from school, to check out books, print assignments for class, etc. After school, our newly designed Credit Recovery program allows any student to access the library after school until 4:00, four days per week.

This Friday PTHS will host our third Friday Salon for the year. Award-winning journalist and author, Mary Ellen Hannibal will be here to present and discuss her book, "Citizen Scientist: Searching for Heroes and Hope in an Age of Extinction". She will also be presenting this Sunday with the Marine Science Center, 2:00 p.m. at Fort Worden Chapel. Our Friday Salons are open to the community, and are held from 1:50 – 2:50 in the high school auditorium.

### K-8 Exhibition Night

Many of our elementary and middle level students and their parents attended our K-8 Exhibition Night on Tuesday, November 22. Students had the opportunity to share their “Books of Knowledge”, which included their studies about culture, inventions, geography and civics. Each student created their own culture and developed flags, maps, foods, costumes, animal species, and more.

They wrote stories about an aspect of their culture, complete with complex characters and plot lines. After sharing in small groups and individual presentations, we followed up with a potluck and opportunity for parents to get to know one another.



### Languages

High schoolers aren't the only one learning languages at OCEAN! Elementary Language Exploratory class has been learning languages that coordinate with the invention studies in their social studies classes. We learned the Greek alphabet and basic greetings, semaphore (flag alphabet), and German greetings and names of body parts.

### Watersheds

Colder weather brings out the creative side of core studies. High school students put together their knowledge about watersheds and shoreline vegetation to create 3-D representations of a watershed, most of which were complete with shoreline vegetation and salmon cycles in addition to the geographic representations. Students made keys to understanding the complex diagram. They completed self-evaluations of the group and personal effort and quality, and presented their projects to the class.

On Monday, November 28<sup>th</sup>, Liz and Daniel shared celebrations of the 2015-2016 school year and priority goals for the current school year to the school board. We are especially proud of our maritime connections, community partnerships, OCEAN Play, student blogs, and expeditionary learning. December is full of activity. The 3<sup>rd</sup> grade team and a group of high school teachers spent a day planning exciting maritime and place-based projects. Port Townsend School of the Arts received a grant from the Port Townsend Arts Commission that will support getting Grant Street students out to work with teaching artists at the Fort. Katy Karschney worked with our teacher leaders who will be leading many of the Wednesday afternoon, district wide, professional development sessions this year. They planned and tuned sessions, and will be leading the December session on Project Dimensions. High school staff is all participating in teaching lab rounds, observing student thinking, and reflecting on their leading edge in their teaching practice. Many teachers are completing their first maritime or place-based project with students, and will be diving into a second project in the New Year.

## **Special Education and Assessment ~ Director, Patrick Kane**

### Special Education –

Two teachers, Rene Olson and Darlene Marmol, attended a workshop in Port Angeles to learn about writing transitional goals for students with an IEP. This workshop was sponsored by OESD 114 and was very valuable plus tied in nicely with the work the district is doing on transitional services. Attending North Kitsap SD and the OESD 114 informational meetings, Sara Mitchell and Laura Cook picked up some valuable information on helping students communicate and using augmented technology to help improve communication disorders. They were really excited with the information they received at both locations and they are looking forward to using it their respective buildings.

On Wednesday, November 30, I held an hour meeting with parents and educators regarding services the school district should provide for students and teachers in non-profit private schools in our school district boundary. There were good questions and conversation about how the district can support who have special needs at those private schools.

### Assessment Information –

There is a webinar next week to refresh information about the State assessment, SBA. The State assessment is not that far away and it is nice that the State is providing this information for districts throughout the State.
